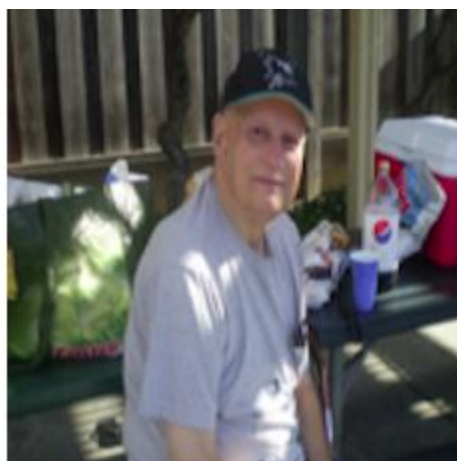

After a recent decline in health Arthur (Art) passed away peacefully in his sleep on March 18, 2016 at the age of 85. He lived in San Jose for most of his adult life where he was married to Alice and had three children, Sharon, now deceased (Richard) Sue, (Dietrich) and Jeff (Stacie). Alice passed away in 2005; they were married for 51 years.

Art was born and raised in Mount Vernon, New York, then went to college at the

University of Connecticut. He later transferred to San Jose State University and received his BS in Administration of Justice, later achieving his MBA. While in college he was heavily involved in the ROTC program where he met his future wife Alice. After college he joined the Army and was stationed in Munich, Germany. When his service in the Army was completed, he came back to San Jose and worked as a Police Officer for the City of San Jose for 30 years. While working for the police department he taught Criminal Justice at West Valley College. He retired as a Lieutenant after 30 years. Within 2 weeks he began his new career with Lockheed Martin as Chief of Investigative Services. He was employed by Lockheed for approximately 10 years. During this time Art was still involved in the Army Reserves, Selective Service, and the Military Officers Association of America. He retired as a Colonel. Art was also involved with the Police Officers Association, Juvenile Justice Committee, Lions Club, and the San Jose Airport Land and Use Committee.

After retiring Art and Alice enjoyed traveling with their friends, cruising to exotic locations around the world.

Art is survived by two of his children, Sue Crase, and Jeff Knopf and his four grandchildren, Dan Crase, Lea Crase, Thomas Knopf, and Sydney Knopf.

The following was prepared by Art's close friend, retired Capt. Larry Otter...

I knew Art for about 64 years, starting at San Jose State. He first went to work for the Santa Clara Co. Sheriff's Office, but chose to join the SJPD in 1956. After receiving his first promotion to Juvenile Officer he specialized in juvenile work for the rest of his career. Art was active in other ways as well. He joined the California Peace Officers' Association and became active in the Law and Legislation Committee and remained in that capacity until his retirement in 1986. (I later joined him on that committee.)

While in college and ROTC, Art was a distinguished military student which gave him a path to a Regular Army Commission and career. But he chose to stay with the SJPD following his active military service. He plucked a secretary whose name was Alice from a colonel he worked for. Their marriage lasted until Alice's passing. They produced three children: Sharon, Jeff and Susan.

I became Art's boss when he was the Lieutenant of the Juvenile Division and induced him to join my Lions Club (the San Jose Host Lions Club). He remained a member for the rest of his life, serving as President two or three times. Art was active in other areas as well, serving on the San Jose Airport Commission.

He remained active in the Army Reserve until his retirement. For several years, his summer active duty assignments were with General Hershey, the czar of Selective Service. He retired as a Full "Bird" Colonel and stayed active in the Retired Police Officers Association. Until his health began to fail, he was a regular at the monthly Police Benevolent Assn. meetings as well.

Following his retirement from the SJPD in 1986, Art went to work at Lockheed Missiles and Space Corporation as a Chief Investigator where he dealt with employee misconduct. When I joined him a couple of years later at Lockheed he was my boss and

got even for the time I was his boss at the PD.

We remained good friends until the end, having lunch once a week with other "old buddies." Art leaves a big hole behind him.

He always welcomed former friends and colleagues when they visited Hawaii. When Tom departed the Mainland for The Islands, Jim Guido and I saw him off on the Lurline, a transpacific steamer that made regular trips from California to Honolulu.

THE TRIALS & TRIBULATIONS OF SAN JOSE AND THE SJPD

SJPD Ramps Up its Staffing Effort

SAN JOSE — At a time when the San Jose Police Department is fielding historically anemic police academies, officials are streamlining recruitment of military veterans by accepting their service in lieu of the college credits required of an entry-level police officer. The decision was announced last week and comes after Chief Eddie Garcia and city leaders talked earlier this month about a staffing crisis in the storied police department, which is fielding just over 900 officers after boasting more than 1,400 eight years ago. It's also the first time that the rank-and-file numbered fewer than 1,000 since the mid-1980s. Under the Military-in-Lieu of Education Recruiting Program, prospective police recruits who have been honorably discharged from the U.S. military — the department listed the Air Force, Army, Navy, Marines or Coast Guard in its announcement — can substitute up to four years of service for current college requirements, which stand at 40 semester credits or 60 credits at quarter-based

schools.

“Veterans offer a high level of experience, training and expertise that are relevant to local law enforcement,” a police statement said. “Although a college education remains critical for building a well-rounded police force committed to learning, service and community, the training and experience of veterans are recognized as an appropriate exchange in lieu of SJPD’s application requirements for a college education.” In the statement, Garcia said: “This is a great way to honor our military veterans by acknowledging their service and dedication to this country and to pave the way to a career in law enforcement with the San Jose Police Department.”

SJPD is struggling to maintain its staffing numbers and is getting little relief from its academies: The current class numbers just seven and the next crop is expected to be similar, prompting police brass to consider shelving its in-house academy in favor of outsourcing to regional academies. While there have been hundreds of applicants for each class, just a few have made it through stringent backgrounding and aptitude tests. As recently as a decade ago, the department was fielding classes in the 50s and 60s. Part of that has to do with a trend of higher-caliber applicants passing on San Jose in favor of other local agencies as the city has seen an exodus of police officers, spurred in large part to a political clash over pension-reform measures. A tentative agreement between the city and police union was reached last summer, buoying hopes for a recovery, but it could be delayed by a lawsuit filed by a local taxpayers group that wants to put that settlement before voters in November. That clashes with the police department, union and city, which want a judge to implement the agreement as soon as possible to stem the bleeding, and led to those bodies banding together in a March 10 news conference to stress unprecedented urgency, noting that SJPD is implementing mandatory overtime to reach baseline patrol needs. Here's How the GOP Could Stop Both Trump AND Clinton

A lot of people in the Republican party are talking about how they want to stop Donald Trump from getting the White House. But how would they do it? Here's the math.

The best strategy to not only dump Trump but beat Hillary Clinton in the general election may be to run a completely different ticket under another name, and keep both Trump and Clinton from getting the 270 electoral college votes (a majority of the 538 electoral votes) necessary to win the presidential election. When a candidate fails to get a majority of the electoral votes, the president is decided by the House of Representatives and the vice president is decided by the Senate. (And the Republicans currently control both.)

Get out your calculators and follow along with these two strategies with two different tickets:

Option 1: Go for wins only in Texas and Ohio with a Ted Cruz/John Kasich ticket.

This scenario would leave Clinton with 248 electoral votes, Trump with 234 and Cruz with 56—all short of the 270 needed to win. The Cruz/Kasich ticket would have to make sure it does not get on the ballot in leaning red states like North Carolina, Indiana, and Missouri, just in case they swing one or two of them Clinton's way. But most importantly, this ticket would need to do absolutely no campaigning in Florida. If she wins Florida, almost no scenario leaves Clinton with fewer than the magic 270 number.

In fact, Trump needs to win Florida in every one of these third-ticket scenarios. If there were any viable establishment Republicans who could win Florida in a three-way race against Trump and Clinton, things would be different. But there isn't, (I'm looking at you, Marco Rubio).

Option 2: Go a little more national with a real bipartisan ticket of Ted Cruz/Joe Manchin.

With only two state wins, a Cruz/Kasich ticket would have a harder time convincing a potentially paranoid Republican House delegation from spurning Trump. So, why not go a little more national and get some Democrat support too by putting West Virginia Democratic Senator Joe Manchin on the ticket? Now that Clinton has become Public Enemy No. 1 to the coal industry, I think Manchin could be convinced to run. A Cruz/Manchin ticket would have a good chance of winning Texas, West Virginia, Kentucky, and maybe Wyoming and Virginia.

Again, that ticket would have to stay off the ballot and be a non-entity in North Carolina, Indiana, Missouri, and especially Florida.

Once the vote moves to the House, I think Cruz and Manchin would have an easier time getting to the magic number of 26 state delegations to vote for them. (That's how it works in a "contingency election." Each state gets one vote and is decided by its existing Representatives to the House).

Thirty-three state delegations to the House are currently majority Republican, which means a Cruz/Manchin ticket could still win even if it lost as many as seven of those states to Trump. And three state delegations are now tied between Republicans and Democrats, putting them in play as well especially if Manchin can reach out to a handful of his fellow Dems.

This may seem a little like fantasy football but for a GOP that's facing two doomsday scenarios and no other viable option right now, this may be the only way out. And to many conservatives, it's worth almost anything to help the country avoid getting a president who would be the most personally hated man or woman in the White House from day one.

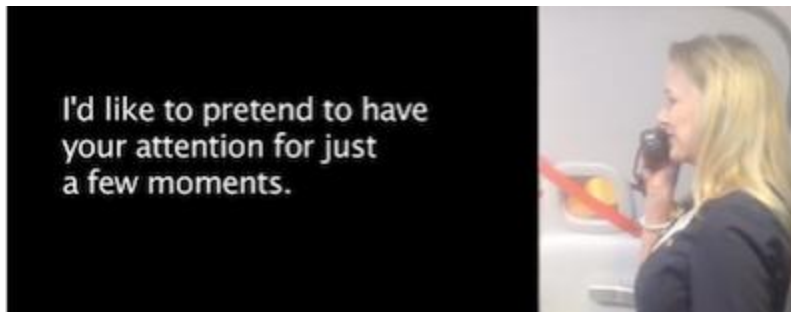

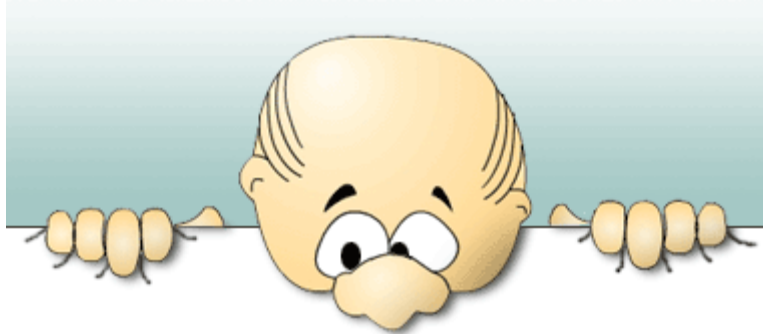
